

Regulations

of the 7th International Clergy Polish Correspondence Chess Championship

1. Purpose:

- To determine the Champion of Poland in correspondence chess among clergymen
- To integrate clergy within common passion chess
- To celebrate St Teresa of Avila, patroness of chess
- To compete and gain chess rating benefits
- To gain ICCF title norms, if available

2. Tournament Organizer

The Polish Correspondence Chess Commission of the Polish Chess Federation supported by the Roman Catholic Diocese of Drohiczyn is organising the tournament.

3. Period of play

The tournament will start on 2020-09-15 with end date 2021-12-15. Separate announcement will be issued.

4. Participation

This is invitational event and invited players participate in this event free of charge. Participants are clergymen from Poland and abroad. The organizer reserves the right to reject entry without giving a reason.

5. Playing system

This tournament is rated and it is supposed to be a single round robin event played by ICCF server. Maximum games played will not go beyond 12. The tournament can be Scilli type (10 games) for more than 13 applications.

6. Time control and rules

Standard ICCF Rules apply.

The event will be rated with title norms, if possible. Time control - an incremental rate of play (initial time: 10 days per game plus increment: 1 move in 3 days with duplication after 20 days; 20 days leave per year, no special leave).

Linear conditionals can be entered. This tournament allows claims based on the 7-piece tablebase.

7. Tiebreaking

Standard tie-breaking will be used to determine the winner and place of tied players:

- number of wins by each tied player in the tournament,
- points evaluation by the Sonneborn-Berger-System,
- results of the tied players against each other.

In case of Silli-like event tie-breaking will be adjusted accordingly and provided in separate announcement.

8. Prizes

Winner will receive title the 7th International Clergy Champion of Poland in correspondence chess.

Other prizes might be awarded, if applicable. Details will be provided in separate announcement.

9. Entries

Players may enter in the usual way through their National Federations.

Entries via National Federations should contain player's name, living place, qualification background (diocese/ seminary/ order and the role performed in it), ICCF ID and should be forwarded by e-mail to Mariusz Wojnar, e-mail: mariusz.wojnar@gmail.com, to reach him before 31st August 2020. It would be appreciated if Federations send entries "as received" and not delay them until closing date.

Registration will close on **2020-08-31** to allow for pairings.

10. Final arrangements

Arbiter of the event will be appointed by the Polish Correspondence Chess Commission of the Polish Chess Federation.

Interpretation of this regulations belongs to the organizer. Interpretation of playing rules belongs to arbiter (Tournament Director-TD).

ICCF Delegate for Poland Tournament Organizer (-) Mariusz Wojnar Roman Catholic Diocese of Drohiczyn (-) Fr. Krzysztof Domaraczeńko Stephen Dunning has sent me this report into his visit to Sierra Leone last year, which some of us supported.



SIERRA LEONE REPORT 2019

From 1745 to 1748 John Newton (the author of the famous hymn, Amazing Grace) was based in Sierra Leone. For some of that time he was held as a slave himself. He was later to write of himself at that time as "once an infidel and libertine, a servant of slaves in West Africa." It was during a storm on his journey home to Liverpool that the Lord began to turn him from his sinful ways to himself.



I have had the privilege of visiting Sierra Leone a number of times over recent years to do Bible teaching. My latest visit was in October 2019. This was actually my seventh visit, and the second time my wife, Pat, was able to accompany me.

Sierra Leone is a country in West Africa, and is slightly smaller than Scotland. The population is about 7.5 million, 1 million of whom live in the capital Freetown. It is one of the poorest countries in the world, and suffered from a vicious civil war in the 1990s. You can still see the evidence of fighting in some of the bullet-ridden buildings, and the human cost when you meet people whose hands had been chopped off. The country in 65% Muslim and 15% Christian with the rest being the tribal religions. Many of the Muslims and Christians are such because it is their culture rather than because of a deeply held faith. Many of the churches are infected with the prosperity gospel, and good Bible preaching is uncommon.

Most pastors have little or no training. The aim for my visits is to help teach them and to model expository exposition. On this occasion, I was able to teach on the opening chapters of Genesis, and leave behind some detailed notes that they can use to teach in their churches. People from all sorts of backgrounds attend the sessions and most seem to appreciate having the Bible opened up for them.





We stayed with two UFM missionaries, Jayne & Lamin Dumbuya. Jayne is from the Republic of Ireland, and her husband Lamin is from Sierra Leone - I've known him since my first visit in 2006! They work closely with Paul Bockarie, pastor of Grace Community Church in Freetown. Jayne and Lamin work with a number of children's groups, but particular seek to train people in children's work. They also have some input with young people in a remand centre. Paul heads up teaching ministries in Freetown and around the country.



We had a hectic start. Our flights, both outward and return, were delayed by 24 hours! After arriving a day late, we travelled early the next day to Kenema in the east of the country. Here I had two days of teaching, only slightly shortened because of getting there later than originally planned. About 80 or 90 people came to at least one of the two days. Most were pastors from the city and the surrounding villages, but some were simply local church goers who wanted to learn. Everybody who came was given a copy of Reformation Today magazine.

The following week I taught at a Pastor's retreat on the outskirts of Freetown. This was smaller, and a number of pastors attended from around the country. We had about 30 or so young men. Again we gave them all copies of Reformation Today magazine.

TBI (Tyrannus Bible Institute) runs in the centre of Freetown on most Saturdays. People from Freetown commit to a three year course of



study covering the Bible and theological topics. I had a day with them and lectured on the Lord's Prayer in Matthew 6. These are people interested in good biblical teaching, who then go back to



their churches where they are better able to serve. They too received copies of Reformation Today!

However, TBI couldn't be held on the first Saturday we were there as it was National Cleaning Day. People are not supposed to leave their homes before midday, and use the time to clean their homes and the surrounding area. Therefore they have a monthly meeting in the afternoon to which people are invited to a talk on What the Bible says about... I was asked to speak on Baptism. Some of those there would

be from non-baptist churches. We surveyed all the passages in the Bible about baptism and drew some conclusions, as well as having time for questions.

I was also able to preach twice at Grace Community Church. I have preached for them on previous trips, and it is always good to meet up with people I know from then. It is also an interesting experience. Next door is another church, with a very loud PA system and enthusiastic preaching and singing. It is not always easy to hear yourself think.

My wife was able to help out with a number of children's events doing various craft activities. At one children's club which Jayne and Lamin run weekly, they had well over 90 children attend. Pat is involved with Open the Book, material that is approved for use in Welsh schools and run by volunteers. She was able to lead a session of this, and leave materials that could be used in the future.

Sierra Leone is a fascinating place to visit, and I have always felt very welcome. It is humbling to see the hunger for God's word. I am amazed at how long people will sit and listen on uncomfortable benches, and they always want us to go back. It is impossible to fulfil all the requests for teaching. There is a great need for training. Many pastors look after more than one church, and have never been taught how to preach or how to study the Bible. We are able to play a small part in helping them, but there is much more that could be done.

There are also opportunities for the gospel. Many church-goers need to hear the true gospel. Some people are taking the gospel to villages without a church, often in Muslim areas. Please pray for the growth of Biblical teaching and Biblical churches in this part of Africa. Carlin v. Partridge and return game

Bruce Carlin writes: We were going to leave our games until later as Tim was hoping to move house but the lockdown in the UK prevented that at the same time as I found myself locked down in India, so I suggested that we might as well get on and play as I did have internet access, albeit I might be at a disadvantage in the Opening as I had no books to refer to. The games continued after I did finally get home, even during our flight as I booked internet access on our flight home in case arrangements needed to be made and was able to welcome Tim to the 'mile high chess club'.

By move 24 both games looked fairly locked down in sympathy with no pawns taken in either and I suggested that although on the whole I regarded agreed draws as a bit of a failure I wondered if that might be the best outcome, but Tim did not reply so we carried on.


In the game where I was Black the first pawn was taken on move 28. By move 40 I rather wished we had agreed draws as my position does not look good, but a few moves later Tim made a mistake and gave me a Rook. I was surprised when he swapped Queens on move 48 as I felt that effectively gave me the game, and by move 56 he can't stop me promoting my d-pawn as I would be quite happy to sacrifice my Rook to stop him promoting his pawn. If I need it, I can always promote another pawn later, but Tim resigned at that point.

The other game turned into something of a marathon. The first pawn wasn't taken until move 32, and then we had more promoted pawns than I have ever known in a single game of chess, the first albeit short lived, on move 71, but as I had passed pawns at both sides of the board I felt it unlikely he could stop me promoting at least one of them. In the end there was something of a race and we both promoted on move 85, before I got another one a couple of moves later. Tim finally resigned on move 93 with mate certain the next move.
