
CHESS minister!



February 1993

As I write this Nigel Short has just won his match against Jan Timman and thus goes ahead to challenge Gary Kasparov for the World Championship. Whilst this is a big step forward for British chess over-the-board. Nigel is less enthusiastic about the future for the postal game. He feels that now the best computers are so good at playing chess adjournements will soon be a thing of the past, perhaps requiring the kind of clock and time limit devised and used recently by Bobby Fischer in his return match against Spassky. He also feels that they sound the death knell for postal chess, a form of the game that he has no time for (" ... a game more suitable for cheating at would be hard to devise" was one recent comment in his Daily Telegraph Saturday column). Presumably most clergy can't afford the best chess computers, and I am sure we would be too honest to use them against our opponents even if we could (!?), so I hope that whatever happens elsewhere the CCCC can play on for years to come.

It is clear that we haven't been using our computers in matches against other clubs in any case ... in the 1991/2 BPCF Club championship we placed 5th (out of 7) - full results elsewhere: while in our 'friendly' against the BCCS we currently stand 4-11 down with just 5 results outstanding, so defeat is assured. Nevertheless, we fight on - we have another team in this year's BPCF championship and I have received a challenge from the National Correspondence Chess Club for a friendly (over as many boards as we can raise) hopefully to start in March/April. If you wish to play in this (it only involves two further games against one opponent) please let me know by the end of February.

Some news of members: since the address list published in October's issue, two members have moved: Leslie Clifton Joy now lives at 31 Emmbrook Court, Reading, Berks. RG6 2TZ (0734 873855); while Arnould Hurt has retired (again!) and is now living at 41 St. Augustine's Avenue, Grimsby, S. Humberside, DN32 OLD. (0472 752349). John Wright has told me that he will be leaving the club at the end of the current season as he will also be leaving the ordained ministry and the Church of England as a result of Synod's vote to ordain women to the priesthood. John has for the last few years represented us on the BPCF executive committee, and whilst it is not essential for us to have someone at every meeting it would be nice if someone could at least get to an occasional one. You would need to live around the midlands, or be willing to travel, and have an odd Saturday free - offers to the Secretary please. Finally, Michael Thistlewood has kindly agreed to help me in production of this magazine by typing up the games that you send in (those in this issue are his first) - feel free to send games in future direct to him, or of course I can send them on. Michael may well experiment with different formats for typing up games, so let us know what you think of them as they appear.

The games in this issue are the last I have in stock, so please can I have some more, with or without annotations. There is one member's biography in this issue - again I would like these from members who have not yet sent one in. Also, of course your results as they come in. This year's record goes to John Wright who had two results to me by the end of October - some going! You have of course until 31st July, but if games are not progressing quickly consider moving up to 1st class post or using phone. The remaining results from the friendly against BCCS should be in by 31st March.

Some of you will receive with this a copy of a more or less recent BPCF Information Circular - roughly one per division. When you have read it, perhaps you would pass it on to one of your current opponents. I do not need them back.

34 replies were received to the questionnarie with the October issue, though not everyone expressed an opinion on every issue raised. That is a good response, so changes resulting from this should meet with fairly general approval. The basic figures were:

The first three have thus acheived clear majorities, the last fails though with hindsight I wish I had asked seperately about enlarging Division 2 as on the whole it seems that our higher rated players were more in favour of larger divisions than our lower ones. Perhaps in another year or two when we have seen how it works in Division 1 we may raise the question again. As a result of these figures, it is my intention to do the following:

The new tie break procedures will apply from the current season. That is to say ties will initially be broken by the games between the two tied players, then by progressively disregarding their results against the lowest placed members in the division. Only if that fails to resolve a tie will we then go on to most wins, most black wins, most black draws as at present, and finally drawing lots. International O.T.B. matches seem to be moving towards using speed games to resolve ties, but I am not clear how we could adopt this in postal chess, unless two players had to complete a game in one evening by repeated phone calls!

From the 1993/4 season it will no longer be permissible to play a single game for double points (except that in Division 1 players will only play each other once anyway).

From the 1993/4 season Division 1 will comprise 7 players, each of whom will play each other just one single game. Two players will continue to be relegated, to be replaced by the winners of the two second divisions. Promotion and relegation in other divisions will continue as at present, with a 4th division existing if membership numbers require it. Apart from Division 1, other divisions will continue to contain 5 players, each of whom plays each other twice (sometimes 3rd and 4th divisions may contain fewer players depending on total members).

For this season only, in order to enlarge Division 1, promotion and relegation will have to be modified. Thus only one player will be relegated from Division 1 this year. The winners of both second Divisions will be promoted, and the higher scoring runner up from Division 2 will also be promoted. Only one player will be relegated from each Division 2, to be replaced by the winners of each of the 3rd Divisions.

Finally, most people who expressed an opinion favoured holding a congress every 3 years. I shall see what can be done, but in fact only 14 members answered this question at all, 10 of whom wanted a congress every 3 years. We were lucky to get sole use of Ecton House last year with the small number we had, and if much less than 10 people want a congress at all, I wonder if it would be viable, unless someone has a large Vicarage...

PUBLICITY

The question of publicity and how we might increase our membership was aired at our Silver Jubilee Congress last year. Having some spare space in this issue I thought I would take up this point.

In recent years our membership hasn't really risen at all. We have had a smattering of new members that has done little more than keep pace with members leaving.

Part of this problem has been caused by the fact that we don't seem to be getting the coverage in the church press that we once did. Although I send copies of this magazine to all church newspapers that I know of (Church Times, Church of England Newspaper, Methodist Recorder, Tablet, Catholic Herald, Universe, Baptist Times, Life and Work - let me know if there are any others you think I should include) they do not seem to give us a mention very often. Under the previous regime we could more or less expect a mention in Church Times, but the current regime at that newspaper does not seem to think our activities worth reporting very often (even our Silver Jubilee congress went un-noticed). I cannot speak of other church newspapers that I do not take, though I know we have had an occasional mention in some of them, but judging by the lack of enquiries I receive not recently. Sending copies of Chess minister! to the church press costs us about £10 a year which has to be met out of our subs. Is it worth it, or are there better ways of publicising ourselves? Should I stop sending press copies out, or reduce it to once a year, but if so which? The October issue has results etc. but is not the best time for recruiting new members just as the season has begun.

We could take paid for adverts in the church press, but to achieve full coverage of all denominations would be prohibitively expensive. At least paying for an advert does guarantee that we would get it in! But do people read adverts? Perhaps if it was included in the 'Clergy' classification, and more so if it were a display rather than lineage advert, but they cost even more. We could not fund a comprehensive advertising campaign out of existing subs., but I wonder if one or more members of each denomination would be prepared to sponsor a single advert in the church newspaper they read (let me know first so that we don't end up with several ads. in the same paper!). Around May/June before the peak summer holiday season would seem a good time to do this, and then any new recruits would be ready to start in the new season in October.

Another possibility would be inclusion in clergy mailings. I cannot speak for other denominations, but most C.ofE. dioceses have some kind of monthly clergy mailing in which small items can be included on request (and hopefully without cost). A few sentences describing what the Club is, with the Secretary's name and address might produce some result. Members of other Anglican Provinces (Wales & Scotland) and other denominations can perhaps advise me what similar mailings they have. Again this costs money in postage and copying if it is all done from the centre, so would members be willing to do it themselves writing to their own diocesan office (and perhaps one or two we are not represented), neighbouring ones where circuit superintendents, or whatever equivalent in other churches? This wouldn't give us complete national coverage as we don't have members in even every C.of.E. diocese (which denomination has the bulk of our present membership) still less every area of other churches, but if a member of each church could be responsible for trying to get maximum coverage in their church that would be great. Again, let me know what you are doing so that we don't overlap.

Of course we don't have to increase our membership at all. The decade of evangelism does not necessarily apply to clergy chess! Since subs. basically cover the cost of printing and posting your three issues of Chess minister! with only a little extra to cover central admin., our finances are not necessarily dependant on extra members either. Nonetheless, I feel certain that there are chess playing clergy out there who know nothing of us at all and who might like to join, particularly in non-Anglican churches where our membership is numerically much weaker (albeit in playing strength apparently stronger!).

Below I give some suggestions of types of advert or notice we might place, but am open to better suggestions. Cut out or copy these, or write your own copy if you are prepared to place an advert yourself.

For a diocesan / circuit mailing something like this might be an idea:

The Clergy Correspondence Chess Club enables clergy to play chess with each other by post or phone without requiring the kind of time commitment required for normal chess which many clergy cannot afford. A paid for advert would need to be rather shorter, and my rather long address can be abbreviated. The following includes about the shortest form of my address that should still ensure letters reach me!

CLERGY CHESS PLAYER BUT SHORT OF TIME? Play by post or phone in 5 minutes a day. Details: Carlin, Vicarage, Ragpath Lane, Stockton-on-Tees, TS19 9JN.

Adverts displayed in a box are more eye-catching but obviously more expensive. Try perhaps:

For busy clergy without time to play chess. Play by phone or post in a few minutes a day. Details Carlin, Vicarage, Ragpath Lane, Stockton-on-Tees, TS19 9JN

Although I have used my own name and address in samples given above, you may like to give your own instead as a local contact. This may especially be a good idea in a diocesan mailing or similar where people might actually know you personally. I would be happy to provide you with a sheet giving fuller details for you to copy and send out if you wish to advertise in this way.

If money and / or space permit, you could even include our logo as reproduced below to make your advert even more eye catching! Let me know what you think, and what you are prepared to do.


