
CHESS minister!

October 1990

Welcome to a new season of CCCC. All the information you require for the new season is in this issue of our magazine. Inevitably there is not much room for much else in this issue of the magazine, which is just as well as I haven't got much else to put in (I have one game on file and no biographies). Please may I have some games (annotated or not) and some biographies from some of you that haven't yet written one. I would like these by December for January's issue.

What I have had is a bit of feedback from the 'is this a record?' snippets in the July magazine. You may recall that John Morris said that his opponent in the Railways match had 52 games in progress. Well Alan Mackenzie tells me that Paul Keres says in the preface to his own 'Best Games of Chess' that in the years following 1931 (when he would have been 16+) he often had as many as 150 correspondence games in progress, adding, "this naturally made it impossible for me to play them all well." I should say so! Can anyone beat that?

I also mentioned my own game against Robin Lovelock of the Civil Service, which we had continued as a 'friendly' after the match was over. In July we had been going for 16 months and 65 moves. Now Ruggles Fisher tells me that he recently took part in a correspondence match against a team in Russia. His opponent lived in Murmansk and the return postage often took 5-6 weeks. They began the game in Feb. 1986 and played until June 1989 when they agreed a win each. That's 3 years and 4 months - and they had only reached move 38 and 43 in the two games! John Morris told me of his games with Ivor Davies in the last CCCC season, begun in Sept 1989 and finished in July 1990 - one of the games had reached move 78 before Ivor resigned. That is really quite rapid playing and certainly puts into perspective some of the unfinished games I receive from other CCCC members who have sometimes managed somewhat less than 30 moves in the same period! My own game against the CSCA is now at move 73 (and 18 months), and after all this a draw still looks the most likely outcome!

Anyway, back to this year. The season does not officially start until 1st October, but I will be on holiday by the time you get this so I am sending it out early as I will not be back until 6th October - please note this in case you have any problems. Also members of Division 3D please note that William Lewis will not be back from a period abroad until 11th October. He is granted extra cessation, and time in those games will not count until 20th October.

We welcome back William Lewis into full play, and also Ruggles Fisher who returns to the league this year. It seemed totally unfair both to Ruggles and his opponents to put a former 3 times winner in Division 3, but I could not see how we could put him straight into Division 1 without either demoting David Hulme who was 3rd and thus earned the right to stay up, or refusing promotion to one of the Division 2 winners, which would have been unfair as they both deserve it as they continue their rise through our league. However, Chris Wiltsher won one of the third divisions but has withdrawn for a year as he will be away for some of the time, so this has given me an ideal opportunity to put Ruggles into Division 2. Welcome also to Peter Knights, our only completely new member this year.

Our lack of new members may reflect the fact that for the first time that I can remember we have not been given a mention in Church Times during the summer. The new regime there evidently does not regard (ecumenical) clergy chess as worth any column inches, though they continue to report their own (purely Anglican) cricket cup faithfully!

This is a shame, but unless we can persuade the editor to change his mind we are going to have to do our recruiting by word of mouth or perhaps take out an advert. The other church press also receive Chess minister! and intermittently give us a mention, though as I do not take all the church papers I don't always know. Perhaps those of you who read them could let me know if you see mentions of CCCC. I do know that the 'Universe' got in touch with me a while ago, but if they printed anything it hasn't resulted in an increase of R.C. members. of which we currently have one. Don't R.C. clergy play chess?

Chris Wiltsher and Paul Smith become Non-League members this year. The list of non-league members appears at the foot of this page, such members are entitled to play for our teams and often enjoy a 'friendly' game or two with each other - each of you has a game card enclosed and should just contact another non-league member when you feel you would like a game. League members who finish their games early may also like to have a 'friendly' with one of these members.

Farewell to John Sigsworth, John Hutchison, Geoff Wood, and Albert Radcliffe who have left us. Perhaps we will see you back in future? Among other members. Gordon Geddes has returned to parish ministry and his new address in on the back cover.

We have had some plaques made for CCCC winners (our logo on a silver background wood mounted) and are sending them out to past winners as well. Apart from those I know to have died there are just two past winners I cannot trace - M.J. Wentworth (winner 1978/79) and G. Johnson (winner 1975,76,77). There are too many G. Johnson's in Crockford to identify which is ours (if he is indeed an Anglican) - can anyone enlighten me? I have an idea that Wentworth is our sole R.C. winner to date - does anyone know where he is?

Subs are due please. These remain at £2 for another year, and next year are going up to £2.50 to make them 10% of Life Membership which remains £1 for every year of the Club's existence, i.e. £24. Why not become a Life Member and never have to worry about subs again? Please send subs direct to Gordon Geddes our Treasurer - please note his NEW ADDRESS on the back cover.

In a year from now we will be beginning our Silver Jubilee season and I hope we can arrange another residential congress to celebrate this, either in the autumn of 1991 or during spring/summer 1992. Please let me know if you would support such a venture.

Finally, I receive two copies of the BPCF Information Circular each quarter as our club is affiliated to them. These magazines contain a number of games to follow through aswell as other news about CC matters. I usually send these out to two of our members at random and hope that yo will perhaps in turn pass them on to other members of your division or whatever. They are rarely topical as such, so are still readable months after their publication date and so worth passing on.

7th IPSWICH CHESS CLUB

Perhaps surprisingly the Civil Service Chess Association, who we beat in our match with them last year, did rather better than that result suggested they would, only loosing out on 2nd place on the tie break of disregarding lowest boards. Ipswich CC had only joined the BPCF to enter this championship, so it was their first effort in such a match. The Postal Chess Club were generally regarded as the favourites and indeed turned out the winners, though in the one match we played against them we got two draws. With a bit of luck in the pairings we could stand a chance...

OTHER MATCH NEWS

We are currently engaged in two matches against other clubs, due to be completed by next January. It is of course early days yet, and as I have remarked before I always get told of our wins first, but a few results are in from these matches and the situation is encouraging. We have an 8 board match against the Railways Chess Association and are currently leading that 5-2 (needing 8.5 to win). We also have a 15 board match against the Social CCA (who narrowly beat us a couple of years ago) and currently lead that 6-4. Team members do please let me have your results as you get them - even your losses!

Our season runs as usual from October to July. You may start games as soon as you receive this magazine, but time does not count until October 1st. All results should be in, or games sent for adjudication, by July 31st 1990, and I am going to get increasingly strict about this as late results threaten to delay the start of the new season.

Opposite are the Divisions for this season. Each person plays two games against each other player in his division, one each as white and black. If both players agree you can play one game for double points (it is up to you to decide who plays white in this case, but I would suggest that if Player A proposes a single game, player B should have the choice). Algebraic notation should be used unless both players agree to use another. At the end of the season players will be promoted, relegated, or moved sideways to ensure fresh opposition. Ties are decided firstly by the number of wins, then black wins (so let me know this), black draws, the games between the two tied players, and finally if all this fails by the Biblical(?) precedent of drawing lots!

If you receive the game card with this magazine then you are responsible for starting the game. Otherwise you should expect to hear from your opponent within a few days. It is always possible that letters go astray in the post, so if you haven't heard from anyone in your Division within fourteen days of the start of the season, please contact the Secretary (but do note that I am away 12th Sep - 6th Oct).

New players will have a copy of the full playing rules enclosed, but as always a reminder of the basics: 20 days are allowed for each 10 moves. Time saved is carried forward. Same day reply and days on which there is no postal collection do not count at all. Each player can have 14 days off during a game after notifying his opponent.

Although not strictly allowed by the BPCF, we do allow the use of telephone to transmit moves. If you are efficient it is both quicker and cheaper. The following guidelines can help:

- Number the games 1 & 2 to avoid confusion, and read back your opponent's last move for confirmation before giving your new one.
- ii. Arrange mutually convenient times to phone during cheap rate, and if out try to ensure that someone else in the house can take down a move - or get an answering machine!
 - iii. Always have pen and paper by EVERY phone in the house.
 - iv. If using algebraic the phonetic alphabet can avoid confusion.
- v. Exchange scorecard by post every 10 moves or so (possibly with a diagram of the position) as a check that no one has gone wrong.

I would like to stress item (iii) above. Phone is only cheaper than mail if you put across your moves within two units (90 seconds in cheap rate costs about 10p). Sometimes there may be a problem to clear up, and occasionally we all like a bit of a chat, but as a rule it should be possible to transmit a move in one unit (45 secs.) IF you are organized. Remember if YOU are not organized it is the OTHER person's phone bill that rises while you find pen or paper.

Since we allow phone, I can see no reason why suitably equipped clergy cannot also send moves by electronic mail or FAX if they so wish.

Whilst second class post (for those who prefer post) is acceptable, it can be dreadfully slow these days (7 days is not uncommon). If it looks as if your game is not going to finish please consider changing to 1st class post or telephone from March or April. We do not mind adjudicating genuinely unfinished games, but some don't look as though anyone has made any serious effort to finish them at all.

- NOTE: Despite repeated reminders a few results were never received, nor were the games submitted for adjudication by 31st August. These have been deemed to be draws in the above table.
- TIES: Ties are broken firstly by the number of wins (rather than draws), then black wins, then black draws, then the games between the two tied players, and if all else fails by drawing lots! The only tie this year was in Division 4 where Carlin wins by virtue of having scored more wins than Hutchison.

1989 / 90 REVIEW OF THE SEASON

John Morris has retained his championship by winning Division 1 by an even more convincing margin than last year, thus becoming the third member to achieve a hat-trick of Division 1 victories. He has been prevailed upon to stay in the league next year to defend his title (someone suggested that we were in danger of needing a special division for past winners otherwise). 2nd place went to Eric Hodgess Roper (another former winner) just half a point ahead of David Hulme. Of current Division 1 members, our President Ivor Davies holds the record for the longest unbroken spell in the top division (he last won it in 1969) but that finally comes to an end as he finished ath and is thus relegated along with John Wright, an untypical result in a season interrupted by illness.

Mike Smith continued his meteoric rise through the Divisions by winning 2A, and now has the chance to challenge for the top honour. Eric Bailey was the only player to beat him on his way to a good 2nd place just ahead of Anthony Foster. Gordon Geddes returns to Parish Ministry in the unfamiliar territory of Division 3, whilst the mighty continue to fall as former champion Brian Stevenson came last and also finds himself down in Division 3.

We have, I believe, once had a Roman Catholic winner of the CCCC, and this year there is a chance of that being repeated as currently our only R.C. member Justin Caldwell has won Division 2B and so gains promotion to the top division. After years of being runner up in Division 1 Geoff Harper must hope that this isn't going to become a habit in Division 2 as well, but that is where he finished this time. William Nicholl finished 3rd, while Angus Norris is back to Division 3 along with Arnould Hurt whose season was interrupted by eyesight problems leading to a result that failed to reflect his ability.

Division 3A was won by Chris Wiltsher, but because he will be in the USA for part of the coming year he has temporarily withdrawn from the league leaving me the opportunity to enter former triple winner Ruggles Fisher into Division 2, since it would be clearly unfair to his opponents to place him in Division 3. David Sutcliffe was a good 2nd in this division ahead of Sigsworth, Harcus and McIntyre.

Division 3B has a certain symmetry about it with a straight 8.5.4.2.0 scoreline, partly achieved by some of the players playing single games for double points. Paul Waterfield ran out the winner and so returns to Division 2, leaving Mackenzie, Thistlewood, Mason, and Couch in his wake.

Division 3C was closely contested, the ultimate winner being Michael Williamson, while newcomer Laurie Janicker was a good runner up from Partridge, Davies and Gowing.

Division JD was a total wash out as all the players bar one dropped out at various stages as the season progressed. This is a very unfortunate state of affairs, particularily for Neil McKinnon, in his first season, who was the only person actually to try to finish all his games, only to have his opponents fall by wayside. Our apologies to him for such a poor first experience in the CCCC. In compensation he 'wins' the Division and gains promotion to Division 2 where at least he should get to play some games to conclusion next season.

Finally, Division & saw a tie between Bruce Carlin and John Hutchison. Carlin getting the verdict through having won more games. David Nye was a very close third shead of Ray Goode and Leslie Joy.

Where players have not taken part in 3 full seasons their results are interpolated. based their actual results, and an * by the score indicates that this has been done. Clearly some newer members will not yet have achieved their potential grade as they rise through the divisions, but hopefully this table does give a guide to our relative strength. Last year's positions are given brackets. It should be noted that this internal grading bears no relaation to any official grading scores.
