CHESS minister! October 1992

Welcome to our new season. Elsewhere you can read the results of last season and the pairings for the new season, which you can begin immediately, though time does not count until October 1st. I have SEEDED this year's divisions as requested and their average grading strength (newcomers are given an initial grading of 10) is shown by each division. Within a Division players are now listed in graded order, rather than alphabetically as before.

I am sending out this magazine a little early as I am going on holiday at the end of September and wanted to get things underway before I go. Please note that if there are any problems I will not be back until October 16th. On which subject a BIG THANK YOU to all of you for getting your results in on time last season: the season officially ended on 31st July and I had all results in by 3rd August - and no adjudications! This was by far the best I have ever had since becoming secretary, and it really does make my life easier as I can get on working out the new season gradually through August rather than having to do it all in a week. Keep it up!

WELCOME back to John Hutchison who found withdrawal symptoms too strong to resist and has returned. Welcome also to Steve Whitmore in his first full season. Against that Eric Hodgess Roper has withdrawn from the leagues but remains a member and may play in our teams. Sadly, we record the death of Henry Cullen at the ripe age of 84, one of our longest standing members and champion in 1975. Once an RAF Chaplain, Henry later worked in parish ministry before retiring to Lincolnshire. Although recently in ill-health and no longer in our league, Henry did make it to our first congress at Ecton 5 years ago.

On which subject, thanks to Geoff Harper for his article on ECTON - rather sketchily covered in the last issue, but then Chess minister! was in the post less than 48 hours after the congress ended! Thanks also to Norman Davies who acted as official photographer. Individuals will have photos included with this issue - for further copies or copies of the group photo contact Norman. It isn't easy to photocopy colour prints but an attempt has been made overleaf to show John Morris handing over the Secretary's Trophy to new winner David Hulme.

Thanks to those who have submitted GAMES. There is never much room in the October issue for games and I am not going to make the mistake I did last year of enlarging it by 4 pages (though I will use the inside covers) only to find I then had nothing for the February issue! That issue is always thin on news and admin., so this time will have lots of games - keep them coming, they WILL be published sooner or later.

And now to some possible suggestions of NEW RULES and structures for our club which came up in discussion at Ecton. I promised I would put them before the membership and if you like the ideas they will be incorporated into the 1993/4 season. There is an addressed card with this issue and all you have to do is tick a few boxes and stick a stamp on, so do please let me have your views.

TIE-BREAKS: Proposal that tie breaks should in future be decided first by the games between the two tied players, then by progressively disregarding their results against the lowest placed members in their division until the tie is broken. This method is often used in Team championships. If this still fails to break a tie then continue with wins, black wins, black draws as at present. For what it is worth this new method would only have reversed the result in one of this year's a ties (Nicholl/Kings). In addition it is proposed that there be no tie break at all at the top of Division 1, but that in the event of a tie the title be shared.

DOUBLE-POINTS GAMES: Proposal that single games for double points make the longer be allowed. Very few players use this option, and where it is used it often distorts the results of the division. If the next proposal is accepted this will in any case not be an issue.

NEW DIVISIONS STRUCTURE: Feeling that as Division 1 gets ever close) relegating 2 from 5 (40%) is a bit stiff, a member of Division; proposed that Division 1 be enlarged to 7 players, each playing just a single game against each other, with still 2 players to be relegated.

ADDITIONALLY, that this proposal be extended throughout the leagues at that all divisions are of seven players each playing each other once This would mean members playing only 6 games instead of 8 at present but would increase the cost of phone or post with 2 extra opponents Division 4 would no longer be needed under this system and there would be spare capacity for new members in enlarged Divisions 3 (which depending on overall numbers may often contain fewer than 7 players).

Do let me know what you think on the enclosed card. As far as the Division I proposal is concerned if you feel you are unlikely ever to reach those dizzy heights you might prefer not to vote, but for the rest all views will be considered. I would be happier with a clear majority in favour before introducing any changes, though no necessarily a General Synod 2/3 result! Some of you are kind enough to express concern as to whether things will cause me extra work, but as far as I can see none of these changes would make any significant difference to the work involved in administering the club, so do not take this into account.

Finally, some members hoped we could have residential congresses more than every 5 years. I am particularly conscious that for those of us still working it is yet another time we are away from the parish and our family, but I am open to your suggestions if you would like us to hold one every year, or every 2. 3 or 5. If more often than 3 I may very well be looking for a volunteer to act as congress organizer!

Full results of all this in February issue, together with what this will mean in terms of this year's promotion and relegation if the proposals outlined above are approved.

Enjoy the new season.

### SILVER JUBILEE CONGRESS by Geoff Harper

The last issue of Chess minister! gave the results of the Congress. If you were involved the bare scores bring back memories of triumph and defeat, inspiration - occasionally, blunders - not a few, solid logical play and some of the opposite. The whole range of chess emotions make the figures alive. If you were not present then figures mean little so I thought I would try to put some flesh on the bones and try to convey some of the feeling of what it was like at Ecton.

The house is a very gracious vicarage built in 1787 in a golden brown Cotswold sort of stone, and converted with the addition of a bedroom wing into a retreat house and conference centre. Ecton is a very beautiful little village, with many old houses and cottages, a Bakehouse Lane and a Blacksmith Yard. There is a fine old church with a deep-toned ring of six bells, useful to encourage concentration on practice night when playing a match! It is a quiet place, restful and at peace with itself.

So we arrive one by one from many miles apart on the warm Monday evening in June. Five of us met at the last Congress so we knew one another not just as voices on the end of a telephone or cunning opponents at the destination of a postage stamp. Some surprises in the folk we have not met. I had an image given by an opponent's play of size and youth quite overthrown by the gentle smiling face of a person of about my own not-so-few years in age. While the champion in appearance quite matches up to his vigorous style of play! By the end of the Congress all will have become friends.

Supper in the gracious dining room, a cup of coffee, and then to the first battle. Calm the nerves! Make a mistake in the opening. Why do I play this game? Oh dear! Well, keep going. Make the best move now. That's a powerful move he has made, what shall I do? Knight there is best. Why has he done that? Now I can swop off and at least be equal. He tries too hard in an equal position. I gain a pawn. Is there a trap here? No. I can protect the King with that Rook move. I gain another pawn. Now even this foolish one can win. Joy!

A look at the other game still in progress. Put the scores down. Then the two of us, no longer opponents, go off for a good long walk down to the river, chatting about chess and families and countryside. This clerical gathering never seems to get into the usual boring clerical talk. So back by ten o'clock and early to bed.

The days are marked, apart from the chess games, by times spent sitting outside the house in the pleasant garden with interesting plants to discuss, walks across the fields, a visit to the church, and each day before lunch a Eucharist in the quiet chapel, a Eucharist which somehow holds together our little fellowship, all the other members of the club and our daily work and living. After the last game of the day there is the Three Horseshoes where Bank's Bitter:

"Does more than Milton can / To justify the ways of God to man."

There is a great good humour about the whole event. To win is fine, to lose a pain. But to take part and to enjoy the logic and artistry of chess, even if the other chap has more of both than oneself, is what pleases above all. I felt it was neatly summarised by the comment made to David Hulme, our Kasparov, by the one who did not often win, "You are the champion and I am the Atlas - the two most important ones here!" Another epigram that caught my fancy was, "Adam was a chess player - he lost a piece and gained a mate."

The aims of Ecton House were summarized by the Warden in his welcome as 'holiness and happiness". This participant certainly left on Thursday feeling I had experienced both, having a lot of fun and also some genuine refreshment and renewal. Many thanks to Bruce for arranging the congress so well. I hope we shall have another soon.

TIES: Ties are broken firstly by the number of wins, then black wins, then black draws, then games by actually playing (rather than by default or adjudication) then the games between the two tied players, and if all else fails by drawing lots!

This year the ties were broken as follows: Division 2B: Kings and Nicholl tied for 3rd. Both had 3 wins (one black), but Kings wins the place with two Black draws. Division 3A: I.Davies & Mackenzie tied for first place. Davies wins with 3 Black wins to Mackenzie's 2. In this division I had conflicting reports as to whether Rumball defaulted or not. As it makes no difference to positions I have given him the one result I received.

Division 3B: Norris wins by virtue of 2 black wins to Warnes' 1. Division 3C: Carlin takes second place with 3 black wins to Lewis' 2.

#### 1991 / 92 : REVIEW OF THE SEASON

After four consecutive championships, the last one shared. John Morris is finally toppled and we hail our first Methodist winner of the CCCC in the person of David Hulme. David of course shared last year's title in our three way tie, but this year he wins cutright adding it to his victory in June's Silver Jubilee Congress.

But it was close, as shown by the spread of just 2 points covering the whole of Division 1 (the next smallest spread in a full five-player division was 6 points). Indeed, when early results came in, we were preparing for quite a different result as Eric Bailey garnered the first points. In the end his two defeats by the champion ensured his relegation, but by just half a point from Justin Caldwell, who a month from the end of the season was resigning himself to going from joint champion to Division 2 in one year! He survives to fight another time along with John Morris who was runner up, while Geoffrey Harper joins Eric Bailey in relegation.

The Division 2 pairings caused some disquiet this year, with 2A on the face of it seeming a much stronger group than 2B. Despite that Ruggles Fisher did what most of us expected him to do last year (until Eric Bailey came along with other ideas!), and comfortably took first place, dropping just half a point to former winner and this year's 2A runner up Eric Hodgess Roper. In 2B Mike Smith won from Paul Waterfield, While Brian Stevenson and Peter Kings were the other survivors. Geddes, Wright, Nicholl and Clifton Joy are destined for Division 3 next year, in the case of Nicholl only on a tie break.

Ivor Davies really had no business being in Division 3, but even so only earned promotion on a tie break from Alan Mackenzie. Oddly perhaps for someone who makes drawing chess games an art form, Ivor won the tie break by virtue of more wins with Black pieces! Angus Norris took Division 3B, again on a tie break from Stephen Warnes. The other two 3rd Divisions were more clear cut, Michael Williamson and Tim Partridge winning promotion with 7/8, each dropping just one point to Carlin and Dales respectively. Division 3D was perhaps a bit distorted by having Charles Mason playing single games for double points, his only defeat also therefore counting double and thus possibly costing him promotion.

In the nether reaches of Division &. Arnould Hurt won comfortably despite suffering a heart attack and being laid up for part of the season. We wish him well for a full recovery, but if he can record results like this when under doctors orders, his opponents next year had better look out!

#### AND A LOOK AHEAD TO '92/93

As to next season. 2nd and 3rd divisions will be seeded to try to avoid a repetition of the apparent imbalance between 2A and 2B. Eric Hodgess Roper has decided to drop out of the leagues, leaving an extra space in Division 2. After some consideration it seemed right that the highest graded player in Division 3 should take that place. Thus william Nicholl who was in any case only relegated on a tie break, will in fact now stay in Division 2.

There seems little doubt that Division 1 will be as keenly contested as ever with two former triple winners in John Morris and Ruggles Fisher, and David Hulme no doubt aiming to be a third. Justin Caldwell makes four former winners out of five, while Mike Smith will doubtless be looking to upstage the lot of them and have his name inscribed on the Bailey Shield after all. Again. Division 1 has an ecumenical look to it, with a Methodist, Baptist and Roman Catholic taking on two Anglicans. May the best (clergy)man win!

## THE NEW SEASON : 1992 / 93

Our season runs as usual from October to July. You may start as soon as you receive this magazine. but time does not count until 1st October. Results should be in or games sent for adjudication by July 31st 1993. I am getting increasingly strict about this as late results threaten to delay the start of the new season.

Opposite are the Divisions for this season. Each person plays two games against each other player in his division, one each as white and black. IF BOTH PLAYERS AGREE you can play one game for double points (it is up to you to decide who plays white in this case, but I suggest if Player A proposes a single game, player B should have the choice). Algebraic notation must be used unless BOTH PLAYERS clearly agree to use another. At the end of the season players are promoted, relegated, or moved sideways to ensure fresh opposition. Ties are decided by the number of wins, then black wins (so let me know this), black draws, games won by actually playing chess, games between the tied players, and if all this fails by the Biblical(?) precedent of drawing lots!

If you receive the game card with this magazine then you are responsible for starting the game, otherwise you should expect to hear from your opponent within a few days. It is always possible that letters go astray in the post, so if you haven't heard from anyone in your Division within fourteen days of the start of the season, please contact the Secretary (but N.B. I will be away until 16th October).

New players have a copy of the full playing rules enclosed, but as always a reminder of the basics: 20 days are allowed for each 10 moves. Time saved is carried forward. Same day reply and days on which there is no national postal collection do not count. Each player can have 14 days off during a game after notifying his opponent. If your opponent exceeds the time allowed you can claim the game by deafult, but you must do this as soon as the time control is broken or you lose the right to claim unless he breaks a later time control. If you choose to be generous and let him off that is fine, but you cannot then claim the game if it is unfinished at the end of the season.

Although not strictly allowed by the BPCF, we do allow the use of telephone to transmit moves. If you are efficient it is both quicker and cheaper. The following guidelines can help:

- Number the games 1 & 2 to avoid confusion, and read back your opponent's last move for confirmation before giving your new one.
- ii. Arrange mutually convenient times to phone during cheap rate, and if out try to ensure that someone else in the house can take down a move - or get an answering machine!
  - iii. Always have pen and paper by EVERY phone in the house.
  - iv. If using algebraic the phonetic alphabet can avoid confusion.
- v. Exchange scorecard by post every 10 moves or so (possibly with a diagram of the position) as a check that no one has gone wrong.

I would like to stress item (iii) above. Phone is only cheaper than mail if you put across your moves within two units (80 seconds in cheap rate costs about 10p). Sometimes there may be a problem to clear up, and occasionally we all like a bit of a chat, but as a rule it should be possible to transmit a move in one unit (40 secs.) IF you are organized. Remember if YOU are not organized it is the OTHER person's phone bill that rises while you find pen or paper.

Since we allow phone I can see no reason why suitably equipped members cannot also send moves by electronic mail or FAX if they so wish.

Whilst second class post is acceptable, it can be dreadfully slow these days. If it looks as if your game is not going to finish please consider changing to 1st class post or telephone from March or April. We do not mind adjudicating genuinely unfinished games, but some don't look as though any serious effort has been made to finish them at all.

## CCCC PERCENTAGE GRADING : 1992

Below is the latest internal percentage grading list for our members. It should be noted that this has no connection with any formal grading of any chess organization, and is simply a means of assessing our relative overall standing within the club. The grading is achieved by taking into account the results of the last 3 seasons, though the scores are weighted to favour the most recent seasons. Obviously new players can take up to 5 seasons to achieve their ultimate grading, so there are inevitably one or two anomalies. Where a player has not competed in all of the last three seasons he is given a score for any missing seasons based on any actual scores from the seasons in which he has taken part. Because of the weighting given to more recent seasons, David Hulme narrowly beats John Morris for 1st place, but no one at present has the maximum possible 100%.

The table below shows: last year's position in parentheses; this year's position; name; percentage grading score; + - = to indicate whether this is an improvement or otherwise on last year's score; an asterisk then denotes that at least one of the scores is interpolated for someone who has not completed in all of the last three seasons.
